For the Love of Children

LET'S GET BACK TO THE BASICS

As a child who grew up in instability and chaos, I am compassionate to the children around me. My heart aches when I see children falling through the cracks of our current culture, especially when they are falling through the cracks because of the decisions adults are making. Parenting and educating is excruciatingly difficult, but I think we would all benefit from going back to the basics. Here are five principles that I am striving to remind myself of and implement as a mom and a teacher:

- 1) Children feel safer with boundaries. Although it can be easy to give up and let them have what they want when they want it, children actually thrive with loving boundaries. They need to know that an adult is in charge and is acting in their best interest in order to feel safe. Children don't know how much sleep they need in order to function or what nutrition their bodies need to develop properly, but the adults in their lives do. Bedtimes, proper nutrition, outside play, limits on screen time, and hygiene habits are all boundaries that we should have in place as safety nets for our children to thrive.
- 2) Children should not have to carry around adult issues. We live in a world with information overload. Unfortunately, our children have access to information online that is too heavy for most adults. When I was a child, I didn't even know who the president was. Yet today, many elementary aged children are worried about politics, world wars, climate change, gun violence, and so much more. These are burdens that adults should be carrying for them, not inviting them into. They have their entire adult lives ahead of them to worry. As children, they should enjoy being

children. As adults, it is our job to limit what information they have access to. Which brings me to my next point...

3) Children need to be protected from the internet. Remember when smoking cigarettes was cool? There was a cartoon camel and a handsome cowboy who smoked cigarettes. Every movie made in the 70's and 80's had incredibly attractive characters with cigarettes in their hands, looking sultry and having the time of their lives. My grandparents started smoking as children and it was perfectly acceptable. They grew up seeing cigarette advertisements where doctors promoted the health benefits of smoking. It wasn't until about 50 years ago that the first Surgeon General Warning came out claiming cigarettes to be bad for your health. Far too many naïve people died of lung cancer because it was easy to get swept up into the excitement of the "everyone is doing it so it must be okay" mentality. Very few people slowed down to think that maybe, just maybe, sucking smoke into your lungs is not a good idea. We find ourselves in the same predicament with the rise of the internet, smart phones, and social media. The first Surgeon General Warning has been issued recently claiming the negative effects of social media on children and teens. Yet as parents, we feel pressured to hand our children tablets, cell phones, and laptops so that they don't feel left out. Many schools still allow cell phones and laptops to be used recreationally in the classroom. What if there are things in life worse than being left out? What if we could prevent the "cancer"?

4) It is good for children to be bored. In our current culture, every second is jam-packed. Children go from school, to aftercare, to



chess club, to dance, to sports without breathing room between activities. This kind of schedule is not healthy for adults, much less children. We want our children to experience everything, but in doing so, we deprive them of the best gift... boredom. It is not until a child gets bored that his creativity gets sparked.

Remember what it was like to be told to play outside until dark? It felt like a punishment at first, especially on a hot summer day. But without the opportunity to get bored, we would have never invented that dumb game everyone in the neighborhood loved playing or discovered how delicious the berries were on the mulberry bush behind the broken down school bus. Children need time that is not micromanaged and without electronics in order to get bored. There will be some complaining and flopping around at first, but eventually the creativity will come alive. They will begin to draw, or paint, or play an instrument, or climb a tree. And if they can't find something creative to do, you can get them to help out with some chores around the house. I find that the threat of chores usually sparks creativity right away.

5) Children (and all humans) are happier when they help others. It is too much weight to carry as a little person to feel that the whole world revolves around you. Compassion for others and caring for things are skills that have to be taught. Left to our own devices, we humans are dangerously self-centered creatures. But we are actually happier when we help others. As adults, we can foster care for people and things by asking children to do simple chores at home and at school. We can also find ways to volunteer and meet needs in the community. Challenging children to do a random act of kindness each day can be a way to train them to look out for those around them. Wouldn't the world be a better place if we looked for ways to help each other? Wouldn't we all be happier?

I hope you have found these principles to be empowering and encouraging. Let's bring back the simplicity and joy of childhood. After all, we're the adults, right?

For our freshmen, visits will begin after Fall Break. I'll be checking in with them academically and introducing them to what a transcript is and how it will play an important role in their future college applications.
