# The Cultivation of Character

I regard my interest in developing an institutional roadmap for character development driven by the school Mission and integral to the school culture as the culmination of my career.

he resumption of school fires me up.

Nothing quite matches the presence of two hundred enterprising and surprising adolescents. On January 2nd, the entire faculty and staff met downtown for a rare opportunity to discuss the main thing: instruction and ways to promote greater teamwork and deliver an ever improving experience to every child. My colleagues were thoughtfully and energetically involved in generating a menu of relevant and common concerns. What are the most widespread

deficiencies and how could elevate our level of play with one bold change? From my standpoint, all of our professional exchanges ought to bear on our charge to instill a 'Christian perspective. Irrespective of one's religious convictions or absence thereof, a Christian perspective lends clarity to what it means to be a good person in all of our relationships, personal and corporate. The most important impact that a school can have is the cultivation of character. Character and intellectual competence complement each other. The structure of sound academic

thinking enriches our growth as virtuous human beings; the moral perspective bolsters our application of our knowledge, of the utmost importance in the discomfiting advance of artificial intelligence into every nook and cranny of our lives. AI does more than fill cracks: the most unsettling aspect of AI is the main frame for our lives that it promises to create without our awareness or control. Like all technological advances, the impact relies on the engineers who design this eerie Creator, who can become a mechanistic sovereign or an instrument for life-improving solutions to erstwhile daunting challenges. Every aspect of character cultivation relies on the example that teacher set. What a lofty and inspiring role for a teacher!

A nimble committee of four teachers and two administrators has been working since the beginning of the year on a curriculum woven through the high school. We are moving in fits and starts, having difficulty finding our footing and protecting time for this critical work. In our discussions, we shun political advocacies and social media trends. At present, we are deriving the menu of character traits from the Baptismal Covenant.

I regard my interest in developing an institutional roadmap for character development driven by the school Mission and integral to the school culture as the culmination of my career. The dominant focus of my tenure as HOS at Christ Church and my current role at FBS has been designing a social curriculum containing explicit habits and values that the school promises to develop in all of its students. Our national history provides a rich and continuous tradition for moral/social education. It harkens back to the church schools of Massachusetts Bay in the 17th and 18th centuries, the intrepid settlement of Episcopal boarding schools in the 19th century from Ohio to California, the formation of the common school movement led by Horace Mann in the 19th century to provide universal public education, Bishop Moody's Social Gospel program best embodied in Northfield-Mt. Herman, an influential boarding school in Massachusetts, and in the 20th century, John Dewey's progressive education movement whose beachhead was and to a large

extent remains at Columbia Teachers College. The common thread in all of these platforms and movements is the school as a medium of moral education.

During the break, I read an op-ed by Bob Greene in the Wall Street Journal, Greene, an occasional contributor to the WSJ and for many years a staple on the sports page of the Chicago Tribune. This year-end bauble was a homily wrapped up in sports lore. On Lombardi Avenue, which runs past Lambeau Field, in Green Bay, where Coach Lombardi spent most of his legendary career, a large clock resides in front of the stadium. It is fifteen minutes early. Why? Because Coach Lombardi insisted that his players fifteen minutes early to practice or else be fined for late arrival. I will quote the punchline in Green's column: "His [Lombardi's] point was that people who want to succeed should have the discipline and courtesy not to keep others waiting. It's a matter of respect: respect for the people with whom you work, and respect for yourself. The way to guarantee that you're never late-that you're never in a flustered rush to begin a task-is to get there a quarter-hour early." Holding ourselves and our students to responsible behavior standards, many of which have fallen into disrepair out of indolence and lack of backbone, is an invaluable legacy that students can take from their school. It's a legacy that we are committed to providing.



### Start them young! Make it fun!

It is a perfect time to create new habits in the new year! The more these moments can become a part of your daily schedule, the easier it is to remember to do them.

If you make learning fun, use games and use all 5 senses, a child is more likely to retain the information and crave more! These experiences also create a bonding connection between the child and adult.

Phonemic Awareness and Phonological Awareness are important to practice to become a strong reader. These activities include practice with both.

Here are a few examples you can add into your daily routine:

1.Breakfast/Carpool: Willaby, Wallaby Woo. This game practices rhyming, which is extremely important for early readers. You can watch a video of me playing this game with my daughter here:
